2.0 Meeting Notes – August 2, 2022

Welcome, Introductions, and Agenda

Danny Shopf, Cambridge Systematics, welcomed participants to the Florida Occupant Protection Coalition (FOPC) meeting and thanked everyone for joining. He reviewed the agenda, and the meeting followed.

FOPC Strategic Action Plan Subcommittee Breakout

Coalition members split into subcommittee groups organized around each goal of the strategic action plan. The subcommittee groups reviewed the action steps for their respective goals. Action step leaders updated committee members on activity progress and took notes on updates to share with the coalition during the Action Plan Report Out.

2021 Safety belt Use Rates By State

Jasper Masciocchi, University of Florida (UF), presented progress on researching states with safety belt use rates above the national average as part of Objective 1C. She provided an update on the literature review and methods used to identify the states and territories with the highest use rates over time. From 2012-2021 the states and territories with the highest use rates were California, Georgia, Hawaii, Oregon, D.C., Washington, Illinois, Michigan, Iowa, Minnesota, and Indiana. Her team compared the states and territories whose use ranking decreased the most based on 5 and 10-year averages. The states and territories whose ranking decreased the most were American Samoa, Guam, Connecticut, New Jersey, Utah, Wisconsin, Montana, Indiana, and New York. Additionally, the team compared the states and territories whose use ranking increased the most were Minnesota, New Mexico, Alabama, Puerto Rico, Nevada, Ohio, Texas, Maryland, Kentucky, Oklahoma, and North Dakota. Florida's use increased slightly, maintaining the state's position near the median. Jasper then compared states and territories by law type (e.g. primary, secondary, or no adult law) and base citation fees.

Jasper cited Center for Disease Control (CDC) fact sheets that corroborated the relationship between the adoption of a primary law and a high use rate. She emphasized that all of the states with use rates above 90 percent had adopted primary laws. Additionally, several of the top states' primary laws are applicable to all passengers 16 and older. This differs from Florida's primary law that only applies to passengers in the driver and front passenger seat.

In summation, primary laws, increased penalty fines, high visibility enforcement, and nighttime enforcement programs were cited as key strategies to increase Florida's use rate.

Jasper concluded with next steps to focus on two to three states for case study interviews. The interviews would identify law enforcement mobilization efforts, media and campaign spending, education and encouragement with emphasis on diversion programs, and demographics.

Participants had the following questions and comments:

- Leilani Gruener, Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (FLHSMV), asked if the states highlighted changed their laws to entail a primary offense?
 - Robert Chaffe, Preusser Research Group (PRG), noted that Rhode Island among others adopted a primary use law during this time period. He emphasized that the largest increases in the use rates in the data sheet provided by Jasper followed adoption of primary use laws.
- Chris Craig, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), asked if the research team could contact National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) representatives from these states and talk about different strategies being used for education and enforcement in these states.
- Robert said that there are two stories evidenced by the data provided. The first is the increase in safety belt use rates among the midrange states to a high rate and states that maintained their high use rates.
- Petra Stanton, John Hopkins All Children's Hospital, asked how many states PRG works in.
 - Robert said PRG has collected safety belt use rate data in eight to ten states this year, but emphasized the work is data collection not trends analysis.
 - Petra asked if Robert was familiar with any of the states ranked highest or states with the most significant increase in ranking?
 - Robert said PRG has worked with Georgia in the past, specifically for nighttime and pickup truck observation surveys. However, he noted that he is not familiar with data and why it is consistently high. He said PRG is not doing work in the top ten ranked states though.
- Danny asked if there is citation data from Texas that could inform a per capita comparison? Are Texas officers reluctant to write citations since the state's base fine is significantly higher than any other states?
- Leilani recommended the research team analyze where/how occupant protection programs are being funded.
- Jacob Gonzalez, Tampa Police Department, said that in his jurisdiction the local fees may make officers reluctant to write citations for drivers not wearing safety belts. He highlighted a "fix it" ticket example that could be used more readily by law enforcement agencies (a reduction in fine if the offender takes a diversion course, for example).
- Leilani asked if the research team looked at county based fines in addition to the statewide base fine? She said the average is about \$130 with increases if the offense occurs in a school zone.
- Tim Roberts, Law Enforcement Liaison Program (LEL), said the LEL team distributed a diversion program survey to state attorneys and law enforcement with very little response.



- Danny echoed Jasper's next steps saying the team should hone in on comparable states. At a future meeting the coalition will identify volunteers for the case study research.
 - Chris said a set of standard questions answering what does the coalition want to know from these states should be developed. He said to select two or three of the states with the highest increase in ranking as well as two or three states with highest decrease in ranking. He emphasized to note whether there was a statutory or enforcement change in each case.
- <u>The coalition suggested a presentation for Occupant Protection for Low Use Groups for next</u> <u>meeting.</u>
- Patrick Riordan, Florida Highway Patrol (FHP), asked if there are additional fines levied by insurance companies based on the number of safety belt use related tickets?
 - Jasper asked if additional insurance based fees are determined locally?
 - Leilani said that could be the case, but that fees applied by national insurance companies would likely be the same regardless of jurisdiction. She noted that there is an annual tax collector fee schedule that could identify which counties opt in to levy additional fines.
- <u>Robert and Jasper coordinating to select states to study with set of developed questions.</u> <u>Volunteers selected at a future meeting.</u>



Updated OP Tip Cards

Chris Craig led a group discussion to provide feedback on the Kids Aren't Cargo and Aging Road User Tip Cards. The coalition provided input and feedback on the tip cards. The feedback was recorded and will be implemented before the next meeting.

CPS Technician and Instructor Conference Session

Krista Ott, Gainesville Fire Rescue, provided an overview of the recent Child Passenger Safety Technician and Instructor Conference Session. Overall, the session was a success with significant attendance and provided significant network and connection value. She said the educator's association also thought the session was a success. Future plans may include expanding the session to the whole chapter at the conference.

Participants had the following questions and comments:

- Danielle Kessenger, Wolfson Children's Hospital, said she appreciated meeting technicians and instructors from across the state. Additionally, the conference session provided the opportunity to correct misinformation and to direct attendees to the Occupant Protection Resource Center, (OPRC). She noted that there were some concerns about travel costs from interested Child Passenger Safety Technicians (CPSTs) that could not attend.
- Krista said the registration process differed from other registration processes, potentially causing some confusion.
- Carissa Johns, Orange County Sheriff's Office, noted that CPSTs value opportunities to network.
- Julie Noble, Golisano Children's Hospital, praised the sessions as excellent and informative emphasizing the importance of connection.
- Patty Turner, University of Florida, agreed that the session provided a good networking opportunity as well as showing CPSTs available resources. She asked if the session could be expanded to include vendor participation?
 - Krista said the normal vendor showcase occurs Tuesday-Thursday and is not necessarily geared towards child passenger safety.
- Chris asked for an estimate of the number of attendees and if there was a registration fee.
 - Patty approximated 75 attendees, emphasizing that there were far more CPSTs than instructors. The registration fee was \$50.
- Krista said the organizers underestimated interest in car seat checks, noting that there were at least thirty attendees who wanted car seat checks.
- Danny asked if a conference session next year would have similar attendance?
 - Krista said it was hard to say, but was optimistic that this year's attendees would reach out to others for next year.



- Danielle said SafeKids is doing away with alternates for certification sign offs. She emphasized the importance of regularly sending reminder emails.
 - o Chris asked if the coalition is sending out reminder emails.
 - Patty said recertification reminder emails are sent out at regular intervals.
 - Danielle strongly encouraged that the reminder emails are revised from mentioning *recertification* to say that the CPSTs *certification is about to expire* to compel CPSTs to recertify.
 - Willem de Greef, FDOT, and Patty will revise reminder emails to reflect this.
- Danny asked if the Child Passenger Safety subcommittee thinks it's a worthwhile event?
 - Danielle said any and all events where CPSTs can network is worthwhile. Ideally, there would be quarterly events by district.
 - There is going to be a virtual event after the Kidz in Motion Conference, which is intended as a networking event for instructors, and helps the subcommittee determine instructor and technician needs. The goal is to do this twice a year.
- Danielle and FDOH staff can be offered to help Krista in continuing endeavors.

Public Comment Period

There were no comments from the public.

Danny gave a quick recap of Day 1. Day 1 adjourned at 4:30pm.



3.0 Meeting Notes – August 3, 2022

Recap of Day 1

Danny welcomed participants and thanked them for attending Day 2 of the FOPC meeting. Danny gave a quick recap of Day 1, reviewed the Day 2 agenda, and the meeting followed.

OP Fact Sheet

Danny presented the annual OP fact sheet. He asked for the coalition's feedback on the data visualization elements. He noted that the fact sheet will be available on the FOPC website once finalized. He discussed the potential use of the fact sheet in conjunction with model language. He reiterated that the presentation of the data contained within the fact sheet can change. He said the fact sheet is intended to provide a high level overview of the occupant protection problem in Florida. He outlined the trends for fatalities and serious injuries and discussed the yearly observed safety belt usage rate, emphasizing the importance of the primary offense law, as well as the significance of Florida's consistency in maintaining a safety belt usage rate around 90 percent. The data team will continue to monitor whether or not changes in trends from 2020 will continue or become an outlier. Danny reviewed each section of the OP fact sheet asking for the coalition's feedback and comments.

Participants had the following questions and comments

- Leilani suggested adding a visualization that displays all age groups by percentage restrained compared to percentage unrestrained over time. She suggested it would show if the rates are changing over time.
- Danny noted that buckling up messaging is consistent year round and that road users that are not buckling up are not doing so consistently. He distinguished the pattern of behavior to other emphasis areas such as distracted or impaired driving.
 - Petra Stanton, John Hopkins All Children's Hospital, agreed but underscored the importance of how changes in routine affect driver behavior, especially for teens and parents. She cited that emergency room numbers are higher whenever there is a change in routine.
- Jacob noted that Saturday and Sunday are so high because Friday and Saturday night citations (after midnight) are grouped on the following day.
 - The night time spikes present challenges for law enforcement. It is harder to enforce safety belt laws at night. The demographics of the late night driver may be different than the day time driver, as well. Late night driving is also when several contributing factors are occurring including impairment, drowsiness, and speeding among others.
- Wanda Tison, UF, asked that of the urban and rural breakdown if we knew how many of those crashes are commuters from rural areas?
 - The analysis is limited to what is available on the crash report. It could be done, but it likely would not demonstrate a dramatically different breakdown in rural compared to urban crashes.



- Andrea Atran, FDOT District Two, emphasized the importance of geographic scaling. She said a statewide perspective may look different than what the districts see day to day.
- Jacob asked if there is an update on the action items related to occupant protection for low use groups?
 - The team is honing in on their target audience and intend to create different materials for different audiences.
 - Even beyond the district level, different communities within a large municipality, such as Tampa, have widely different usage rates.
- Andrea asked for clarification on the federal paid media requirements related to Click It Or Ticket.
 - FDOT's paid media for occupant protection is a two week intensive campaign that is part of the national Click It Or Ticket wave. There is more flexibility for materials, *Buckle Up* messaging rather than Click it Or Ticket, being an example. Target Zero will eventually have safety belt oriented messaging after its initial focus on speeding and aggressive, impaired, and distracted driving. Target Zero focus testing has found that to reach the target audience of young males ages 18-34, the messages need to focus on the effects of unsafe decisions on their family and sometimes friends rather than their individual safety. The recent NHTSA CIOT ads reflect this as well: Knock at the Door 1:60 - YouTube
- The coalition recommended collapsing the 2nd row back, 3rd, 4th, and other seating positions for the seating position visualization.
- Jacob asked for clarification on the intended audience for the fact sheet.
 - The intended audience is the general public. The fact sheet provides a high level overview that should be accessible to anyone that has any level of understanding of the OP problem. However, more detailed data analysis can be provided for specific use cases.
- The coalition recommended creating maps that shows the statewide breakdown of unrestrained fatalities and serious injuries at the county level.



Updated OP Tip Cards

Chris Craig led a group discussion to provide feedback on the Buckle Up in Your Truck and Golf Cart Safety Tip Cards. The coalition provided input and feedback on the tip cards. The feedback was recorded and will be implemented before the next meeting.

Action Plan Report Out

Danny asked the coalition subcommittee groups to report out what was discussed in each subcommittee breakout group. He updated the FOPC Strategic Action Plan on-screen as each step leader reported out their next steps, which can be found in Appendix A. Follow Up Action Items are listed below:

- <u>Robert and Jasper coordinating to select states for further analysis for safety belt use rate best</u> <u>practices to begin case study interviews with developed questions. Volunteers will be selected</u> <u>at next meeting.</u>
- <u>Revisit and review model language.</u>
